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FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY

I often say that "we are all only one fall away". I say it being aware of people, especially seniors, who fall and then suffer complications, often severe ones. I say it in terms of strongly encouraging anyone living alone to obtain some type of alert button so that if they do fall, they will have a way of obtaining assistance. Too many people have suffered alone on a floor because they have no means of alerting anyone to their plight. I it in reference to also say the unpredictability of our lives, in the hope that we will all live our lives aware of how little we really control. At any moment a mishap can occur with far-reaching repercussions. This past Tuesday, as most of you know, Sharon fell on our staircase at home and broke her ankle. This led to a long night at the Emergency Room, a subsequent visit to the orthopedist and then surgery on Friday to repair two broken bones and a torn tendon. Sharon is now in a cast for about 6 weeks. This is obviously a great adjustment to her life as she is an incredibly active person, used to accomplishing many things on any given day. It is an adjustment to me as I have to pick up the slack for many household and shul-related duties. But most importantly it reminds me of what I so often say. We may plan, but we have little control over even what will happen in the next minute. This also interests me because of what we read in the Torah Portion yesterday, the portion of Mikeitz. The beginning of the portion finds Yoseif (Joseph) in prison for a crime he did not commit, having been seduced by his

master's wife and having refused to comply with her wishes. Until then, his life was full of other ups and downs, having been raised as a favorite son of his father Yaakov (Jacob) and then been sold into slavery by his brothers who were jealous of him and upset over his dreams. Pharaoh's butler reminds himself and then relates to Pharaoh how when he, the butler, had a dream while in prison, Yoseif was able to correctly interpret the dream. Within minutes (and as described in a single verse) Yoseif is freed from prison, shaved and dressed appropriately and brought in front of Pharaoh. Very soon after, he finds himself the viceroy of Egypt, second in power only to Pharaoh himself. This is one of the main sources for the expression "yeshuas hashem k'heref ayin", that salvation from God comes in the blink of an eye. It is worth remembering that things not only go downhill in the blink of an eye, but bad fortunes can also be reversed quickly. I will never forget many years ago when a relative told me, shortly after he lost his entire fortune in the diamond business, that he isn't that worried, because if God can take it all away so quickly, he can give it back just as quickly. To me at least, it is humbling and pardon the pun, keeps me on my toes, knowing that I have far less control over what happens in my life than I would wish to pretend. To all of us, let's be as careful as we can be and open to the fact that we are not in control.

Israeli Cancer Diagnosis Breakthrough is Three Times More Accurate!

Hospitals worldwide seek to participate in the study. By United with Israel Staff

Hadassah University Medical Center doctors in Jerusalem announced Monday a "breakthrough" method to diagnose thyroid cancer with 94 percent accuracy. Previously, only 30 percent of test results were unequivocal. The study, led by Dr. Haggi Mazeh, head of the department of General Surgery at Hadassah Mt. Scopus, and Dr. Iddo Ben-Dov, senior physician in the Department of Nephrology, was published in the journal *Cancer, Epidemiology, Biomarkers and Prevention*.

The thyroid gland, located in the front of the neck, plays a major role in the metabolism, growth and development of the human body. It helps to regulate many body functions, including temperature, by constantly releasing a steady amount of thyroid hormones into the bloodstream. However, it is prone to develop small nodules that can turn cancerous. Biopsies are often performed on these lumps to determine if they are benign or malignant. This is done by inserting a fine needle to aspirate some of the fluid in a nodule. Due to the small size of the needle and specimen, nearly a third these biopsies are inconclusive and must be redone. "If it remains inconclusive, the patient is left with two options," Mazeh told

The Jerusalem Post. "[Either] to purchase an expensive , \$3,000 commercial molecular examination or undergo partial or complete gland removal surgery." Should the gland be removed, the patient must take medication to replace the hormone produced by the thyroid for the rest of his or her life.

The first phase of the study evaluated thyroid specimens from 274 patients at Hadassah Medical Center in Ein Kerem. Some of these were benign and some malignant. The researchers identified different expressions of microRNA in malignant and benign thyroid nodules and created a microRNA panel against which they could compare nodule samples, the *Jerusalem Post* reported.

"It turned out that our microRNA panel is very accurate. This is a breakthrough, since this level of accuracy is higher than the other commercial and expensive tests available on the market today," Mazeh said, according to the *Post*.

The team is presently looking for funding in order to increase the number of samples they test and prove the accuracy of their findings. According to Mazeh, hospitals world-wide would like to send samples for testing. He hopes that the test will be readily available for use within a year or two.

What Is Asarah B'Tevet (Tevet 10)?

The 10th of Tevet (known as Asarah B'Tevet) is observed as a day of fasting, mourning and repentance.

What does it commemorate? For years, God had sent His prophets to warn Israel about the impending destruction of Jerusalem and the Holy Temple if they didn't mend their ways. But they derided the holy men as bearers of "false prophecies of doom," bent on demoralizing the nation. They even went so far as to kill one of the prophets. Then it finally happened. On the 10th day of the Jewish month of Tevet, in the year 3336 from Creation (425 BCE), the armies of the Babylonian emperor Nebuchadnezzar laid siege to Jerusalem. Ever patient, God delayed the destruction to give the Jews yet another chance to repent. He repeatedly sent the prophet Jeremiah to admonish His nation, but they foolishly



had him imprisoned. Thus, 30 months later, on Tamuz 9, the city walls were breached, and on 9 Av of that year the Holy Temple was destroyed and the Jewish people were exiled. Unique among Jewish fasts, 10 Tevet is observed even when it falls on a Friday, though it interferes somewhat with Shabbat preparations. It is viewed as the beginning of the chain of events that culminated with the destruction of the Temple and the subsequent exiles, something that we have never fully recovered from, because even when the Second Temple was finally built, it never returned to its full glory.
