President's Message

Passover 2024 (or 5784 by Hebrew reckoning) is here - just as we scarcely finished our celebrations of Purim. I remember it was our beloved Rabbi who once said Purim is considered a warm up for Pesach. Considering the 4 special Shabbatot Torah readings - two of which connect the Yom Tovs, and the principal subject matter (our overcoming extinction via a single catastrophic event in the case of Purim, vs slow annihilation by slave labor and humiliation by the Egyptians described in the Haggadah) - it does appear they are very much intertwined. In these times - it's near impossible to not consider how the current troubles in the Holy Land relate to our long ago battles for nationhood, freedom and survival. It has always infuriated the world that we won't capitulate, lay down, assimilate or just plain go away. The outsized influence given our few numbers has always been resented. The same groups who claim the Bible for their own (or at least pay lip service to what is written there) have neglected what G-d Himself said in Vaetchanan (Deuteronomy

Moses, who has been barred from accompanying his people just prior to their entry, stands before them, reminding them of their promises to God and of their responsibilities in their new land. At the close of the portion, he reminds them that although they are small and seemingly powerless, they were chosen by God saying... "It is not because you are the most numerous of peoples that the Lord set His heart on you and chose you indeed, you are the smallest of peoples..." No country has been more pilloried and condemned by the nations of the world than the State of Israel, yet this small country has produced innovations in medicine, agriculture, technology and the arts disproportionate to its size. We have outlived all the world's great empires, and despite the current conflicts, Israel today still towers above them all through our People's advancement of that which is best in human heritage. 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Overview of Pesach

Following is a brief overview of the observance of Pesach: Per several verses in the biblical Book of

Exodus, one is not allowed to eat, possess or derive any benefit from chametz during Pesach. Chametz is any food containing flour that has come into contact with water, and not baked quickly (e.g., bread, cake, cookies, pasta, pretzels, etc.). In most years, a ritual "search" for chametz is conducted in the home on the evening before Pesach, and any chametz that is found is burned the next morning, along with any other chametz in one's possession. This year this search for Chametz is performed on Sunday evening, April 21st. Some of my fondest childhood memories are being awakened very early by my father, who before leaving for work, would let us all go into the backyard in our pajamas to burn the chametz in our garbage can. As fire departments have become less enamored with this custom, to my knowledge, in most communities special arrangements are made with the fire department to burn all of the community's chametz at one time and in one place. After burning the chametz, a short declaration is made, through which one gives up ownership of and nullifies any chametz that s/he may not be aware is in his or her possession. The first Seder this year is celebrated Monday night, April 22nd. Since we are already in Daylight Savings Time by then, nightfall is quite late and it is preferable not to start the Seder until nightfall; if that is not possible, one should

try to eat matzah after nightfall. The second Seder is celebrated





April 23rd. The Seder is specifically designed to communicate to children the story of our exodus from Egypt. The Seder table is set up to include things not normally on a table so as to stir the curiosity of children. Since its inception, the Seder focused on answering the four questions, known as "mah nishtana", traditionally recited by the youngest attendee. In the place of bread, matzah is eaten as part of the Seder. One reason for the commandment to eat matzah at the Seder is to remember that the Jews were rushed on their way out of Egypt and therefore their bread did not have time to rise. Matzah is also referred to as the bread of the poor man, commemorating the years of slavery that preceded the exodus. Bitter herbs, known as maror, are eaten to remember the sad and difficult times of slavery. Four cups of wine are drunk, symbolizing the wording of God's promise to the Jews while they were in Egypt. It is customary to recline while eating and drinking at the Seder, to re-enact the freedom that was gained with the Exodus. A well-known custom is the "stealing" of the Afikoman, a broken piece of matzah which is hidden during the Seder, challenging the children to find it and return it in exchange for a present. The Haggada, the written guide to the Seder, consists in large part of answers to the child's questions, relating



Cutting the cord: Will Israel's Wi-Charge transform the future of power?

In a world where wires still dominate the landscape of power transfer, a new revolution is quietly unfolding: wireless power transmission. Imagine the convenience of charging your smartphone or electric toothbrush without ever needing to hunt for an outlet or untangle a mess of cords. Picture a digital display at the edge of a supermarket shelf, silently drawing power from what appears to be thin air to illuminate product details or sales. This futuristic scenario is not just a figment of the imagination. It's Wi-Charge. Wi-Charge, founded a decade ago by Israeli technologists, has only recently started gaining traction. The company created what it calls "AirCord" technology, which lets you power devices from a distance. It uses infrared (IR) technology to send power wirelessly to various devices. The Wi-Charge system works like this: Plug the transmitters into regular power outlets or track lighting. These transmitters change electricity into safe infrared beams. They then find the nearby devices and send them the infrared energy. Each device needs a Wi-Charge receiver attached to it. These receivers catch the infrared beams and turn them back into electricity. This electricity charges up the device's battery or a capacitor, which the device uses to power itself up. The founders of the company - Ori Mor, Ortal Alpert, and Victor Vaisleib - had a very successful history in Israel's hi-tech

industry before Wi-Charge. Communication with wireless devices unleashed a \$3 trillion industry and changed our lives forever. "But there was just one thing: this annoying chord," Mor said, holding a white charger in one hand. "It's a hassle to charge. So, we decided to solve it." Mor said he wasn't



sure if it were "stupidity, naivety, or optimism" that got them started, but the journey turned out to be far more complex than they initially expected. It took them eight years of deep research and development. Now, Wi-Charge can be found in devices in 10 countries, including powering advertising signs in retail stores, in Alfred intelligent door locks in residential buildings, in some touchless appliances in hotels, and soon to be implemented in other public spaces, office buildings, and hopefully homes. Mor showed numerous videos of Wi-Charge's system in action. Mor said his dream is "The light fixtures will be embedded with wireless charging. When you build your house, the architect will ask how many wireless electricity points you want, just like they ask how many electricity points you want today."

This is a terrible mistake. The real gentlemen are the people that will not allow anyone for any reason to search their apartments, their pockets or their souls. Only a person under surveillance is ready for a search at every moment. This is the only inevitable conclusion from our maniacal reaction to every reproach, to accept responsibility as a people for every action of a Jew, and to make excuses in front of everybody. I consider this system to be false at its very root. We are hated not because we are blamed for everything, but we are blamed for everything because we are not loved. We do not have to apologize for anything. We are a people as all other peoples; we do not have any intentions to be better than the rest. We do not have to account to anybody; we are not to sit for anybody's examination and nobody is old enough to call on us to answer. We came before them. We are what we are, we are good for ourselves, we will not change and we do not want to." We will do what must be done no matter who likes it. The whole world doesn't like what we do? Its ok. Zionism and the Jewish state is more important than public approval.
